Great destruction caused in conflict between Agnuak and Nu-er Tribes Introduction

EHRCO has, in its reports, repeatedly called on the government to find peaceful solutions to conflicts that break out between tribes from time to time. Since enough attention has not been given to the causes of these conflicts, a new conflict has flared up recently between the Agnuak and Nu-er tribes that live in Gambella National Regional State. During the conflict, great destruction has been caused both to human life and property. This development indicates the seriousness of the problems. The details are given as follows:

The cause and origins of the problem

The Agnuak, Nu-er, Mejenger, Opo and Komo are among the main tribes living in Gambella National Regional State. The Gambella Peoples Democratic Front and the Gambella Peoples Liberation Party formed a coalition called Gambella Peoples Democratic Unity Party that became an affiliate of the ruling party and formed the Regional Council. The just-mentioned organizations administered the Region by effecting distribution of powers. Accordingly, the regional president was from Agnuak, the Vice President was from Nu-er, the secretary was from Mejenger, the Head of security section from Agnuak and Police Commissioner from Agnuak.

The Vice President of the region who belonged to the Nu-er tribe died more than a year ago. Ever since, an individual who represents the Nu-er has not been replaced. The position of Regional Vice-President has remained vacant for more than one year now. The Nu-er tribe have felt that the Agnuak tribe have deliberately denied them the position of the vice-president. This has created bitter feelings among the Nu-er tribes against the Agnuak. While the Nu-er continued to see the with such bitter feelings, a quarrel arose on July 7/2002 at 10:30 a.m. between an Agnuak and a Nu-er in Zone One, Itang town. The quarrel developed into a conflict which has caused great destruction to human life and property to both members of the Agnuak and Nu-er tribes. Besides, it has also been a cause for the displacement of many inhabitants. EHRCO has confirmed the damages caused which are described in general under the schedules below. The number of people who had drowned in Baro River while trying to escape from the conflict and the number of those whose whereabouts are yet unknown and about whom EHRCO has been tipped-off has not been incorporated in this report. Tip-offs received by EHRCO indicate that the extent of damage caused in the conflict is much higher than what has been enumerated.

Until this report was issued, EHRCO has not obtained adequate information as regards the displacement of people on the part of members of Nu-er tribe. However, EHRCO is closely following the case. EHRCO would disclose the extent of displacement caused to members of Nu-er tribe as soon as it receives the information.

Conclusion

As shown in detail in this report, great damages have been caused to human life and property in the conflict that broke out as of July 7/2002 between the Agnuak and Nuer tribes in Itang town, Gambella National Region. Regional officials and the defence forces had hardly made any effort to contain the conflict at its earliest stage. This failure on the part of the appropriate authorities has contributed towards the worsening of the conflict that has caused a lot of damage. The conflict between the two tribes has not subsided and is still raging so much so that it has been a cause of great concern to other tribes in the area.

The Ethiopian Human Rights Council calls on the government to give close attention to the issue, and,

- in full realization of the fact that, the conflict flared up because members of the Nu-er tribe lost a seat of representation in the Gambella National Regional State, facilitate conditions under which representatives of the Nu-er tribe could, in a democratic manner, participate in the political life of the region,
- see to it that individuals, government officials and armedmen who are accountable for the human lives lost and the properties belonging to individuals destroyed and the people who were injured in the conflict should be brought before the law.
- 3. see to it that appropriate compensation is paid to the damages caused to people and their property and to the victims as a result of the conflict, and facilitate conditions under which the displaced persons would be rehabilitated.

EHRCO kindly requests organizations and individuals who advocate the rule of law and stand for ensuring respect of human rights to pass on their call to the following government officials and organs in support of EHRCO.
