Human Rights Violations Occurred During Clashes Between Students and Security Forces in Oromia Region 76th Special Report

5 April 2004

Introduction

It is to be recalled that in its 48th Special Report issued in April 2002, EHRCO denounced the illegal measures taken by security forces against peaceful student demonstrators of East Wellega and West Shewa Zones of Oromia Region.

As a result of a series of student protests in West Shewa zone and other areas of the Oromia Region, starting from 25 February, clashes had occurred and several persons, many of whom students, were injured. Public and private property was destroyed.

Art.30 (1) of the FDRE Constitution stipulates that "Everyone has the right to assemble and to demonstrate together with others peaceably and unarmed, and to petition..."

Proclamation No.3/1991 states under Art.4 (1) "Any individual, groups or organization that organizes a peaceful demonstration or public political meeting has the obligation to give a written notice 48 hours before the intended peaceful demonstration or public political meeting is to take place."

The demonstrators in West Shewa did not respect the law. The actions of some students who threw stones and destroyed property were also illegal and have to be condemned. The security forces and other government officials on the other hand violated the constitutional rights of the students by failing to properly respond to the students' request for peaceful demonstration. EHRCO investigated the circumstances surrounding the clashes between students and security forces and the consequent human rights violations occurred in West Shewa Zone and Jimma town.

The Cause of the Clashes

Students in different towns of the Oromia region staged demonstrations to protest the measures taken in January by Addis Ababa University to suspend and dismiss some Oromo students and the decision of the Oromia State Council to transfer the capital city of Oromia to Adama. In most of the towns the students clashed with security forces who tried to disperse them.

The Clashes in Ambo town

Starting from 8:30 a.m. on 25 February 2004, students of Ambo Secondary School gathered in the school compound chanting slogans. They threw stones at other students who were attending classes. Stones shattered glasses of windows. As the actions of the students grew more and more violent, police entered the school compound and stopped the disturbances. Police also arrested three students on that day. The protests in the schools continued almost daily resulting in the frequent disruption of the educational process.

On 4 March 2004, starting from 8:30 A.M.students of Ambo Secondary and Addis Ketema Elementary schools were marching to the center of the town after gathering in their respective schools. Members of the Oromia Police force tried to disperse the protesters by firing in the air. They also clubbed and whisked many students. The protesting students threw stones at the policemen. Stones hit passing vehicles. The police finally managed to put the situation under control.

In the days that followed, police hunted down several students entering residential houses during day and night times and arrested several students. Classes were interrupted as this report is being prepared.

The following persons have been arbitrarily detained for five days

- 1.Zinna Dirro
- 2. Mulugeta Dirro
- 3. Alemu Debele

These three peasants live in Tekerogge wereda near Ambo town. They were in Ambo town on 4 March to attend a court case. Policemen took them from the house where they were staying on 4 March 2004. They were in police custody in Ambo police station until 9 March 2004. The detainees were released after their families produced letters written from the kebele peasant association, which states that they were peasants.

Illegal Search

W/ro Simegn Kidane Mariam is a resident of Ambo town, kebele 03,house number 246.On 5 March 2004,policemen illegally entered her house and broken into the room of Gobena Tilahun, a student tenant of the room, searched and took photographs belonging to him.

According to information EHRCO received from the Ambo town Police, seven policemen had sustained light and serious injuries during clashes with protesting students. Moreover, glasses of seven vehicles were shattered by stones thrown from the protesters. Roofs and windows of classrooms in Ambo Secondary School were also damaged.

Clashes in West Shewa Zone Tikur Inchini Wereda

On 1st March 2004 students of Tikur Inchini Secondary School gathered for protest in the school compound starting from 8:00A.M.Then, they asked the unit leader to call the school's director for them as they had matters to discuss with him. The unit leader told them that the director could not talk to them. After this, the students began marching out of the school compound. Policemen in the area fired bullets at the protesters. As a result one student was killed. Having watched the death of the student, the protesters threw stones at the policemen. Stones thrown also shattered the window glasses of the telecommunication

office in the town. The police put the riot under control at about 11:00 A.M. Details of the major casualties occurred are presented below.

Killing

Alemu Tesfaye, 20, was a 9th grade student at Tikur Inchini Secondary School. He was shot dead by policemen on 1March2004 while he was out for protest with other students. His body was sent to Menilik II Hospital in Addis Ababa for examination and was laid to rest on 5 March 2004 in Tikur Inchini town.

Beatings

Gadissa Ijjo is aresident of Tikur Inchini wereda Bolarogi kebele peasant association. Policemen beat him on 1 March 2004 while trying to take the body of Alemu Tesfaye (his nephew), who was killed by police on the same day.

Detention

The following students of Tikur Inchini Secondary School were arrested on 4 March2004 and were in Police custody until 10 March 2004.

- 1. Wubshet Bekele,a 10th grade student
- 2. Asefa Kuma, a 10th grade student
- 3. Gelana Kebede Gelgela, an 8th grade student

The Clashes in Jimma Town

Oromo students of the Jimma University had notified the Jimma zone administration on 5 March 2004 that they would stage a peaceful demonstration on 9 March to protest against the dismissal and suspension of Oromo students from Addis Ababa University. On 9 March 2004, they gathered at the University football field chanting slogans. Police in the area told the crowd to disperse, as they were not allowed to stage the demonstration. The protestors ignored the warning and continued chanting slogans. The policemen started firing in the air and rounded up the protestors. Then, they whisked off several protestors to the Jimma zone police station by a bus and four other police pick-ups. Many of the protestors were released latter on the day.14 protestors remained in detention and released on bail on 26 March 2004.

Conclusion

As stated above, the clashes between students and security forces had resulted in gross human rights violations, loss of life and damage to property. The situation has been getting serious by the day and is spreading to different parts of the Oromia Region.

Thus, EHRCO urges the government to give due attention to the requests of the students and give appropriate answers and to facilitate ways that would bring about the smooth continuation of the educational process. EHRCO also appeals to the government to bring to justice those arrested in connection with the clashes and those members of the security forces who committed violations of human rights.

EHRCO also calls on citizens, national and international human rights organizations and government envoys to put pressure on the Ethiopian government to give legal and reasonable solutions to the problems and to bring an end to the actions of the security forces that violate human rights by writing to the government bodies and officials listed below.
